Orientation Programme for B.A. 1st Semester (CBCS) students	The Induction Programme for B.A. 1st Semester Students was organized on 18th August, 2022. Mrs. Bornali Saikia Sonowal, HoD of Economics and Mr. Phanidhar Saikia, Principal (I/C) explained the basic course structure, examination and evaluation pattern, grading mechanism under CBCS to the newly admitted students for the session 2022-23 in the presence of the teachers from various Departments.
Division of syllabus among teachers of the department	At the beginning of the academic session, the Head of the Department allots particular portions of the syllabus to the teacher in writing. The concerned teacher is to transact those assigned portions of the syllabus through the academic session and at the end submit a Course Completion Certificate declaring that he/she has completed the transaction of the assigned portion of the syllabus within the stipulated time frame. As a result of this practice, syllabus transaction has been documented and the Head of the Department submits the Course Completion Certificate at the end of the academic session to the IQAC.
Conducting Survey on Dropout of the Students	IQAC of the college carried out a sample survey to find out the root causes of increasing dropout trend of students in the college. In that context the batch entered in July, 2020 was taken for sample survey. It was found that poor financial

	condition and early marriage among the girls were the driving factors of high dropout among the students. So, the institution need to strengthen the existing financial aids to the needy students along with increasing awareness on the problems of early marriages in the identified areas.
To organize workshop on English Grammar and Composition	The Department of English organized a Weeklong Grammar and Composition Workshop in order to develop the writing skill of the students reducing the learning gaps in English grammar and composition. A total number of 40 participants from the schools and the college were able to develop their ability of writing and speaking English after attending the classes taken by the teachers of the Department of English.
To organize a Syposium on Assamese Literature	The Department of Assamese organized a Symposium on 03/11/2022. Noted Assamese Writer Mrs Juri Bora Borgohain delivered a talk on "Marginalised Life and Subaltern Consciousness in Assamese Novel" where 60 students participated actively in the programme.

Vice- Principal of HCDG College, Nitaipukhuri had highlighted some key aspects of Professional Ethics.
Counselling the Students for Competitive Examinations	The Department of Economics organized an extramural interaction programme on "Development and Efficient Application of Aptitudes in Civil Service Examinations". 15.Multidisciplinary / interdisciplinary

The College offers one undergraduate programme i.e. B.A. programme in six subjects viz., Assamese, Economics, Education, English, History and Political science. It offers flexible credit-based curricula in the Honours programme under the Choice Based Credit System of Dibrugarh University from 2019 onwards. Students of the fifth and sixth semesters are given the freedom to choose Discipline Specific Courses from a basket of courses defined by Dibrugarh University. The students of the 6th semester of B.A. Honours programme in Education and Assamese have to submit a project report on community engagement by visiting different communities living in nearby villages.

However, given the implementation of NEP 2020 in the coming days the college aims to transform itself into a multidisciplinary and holistic higher educational institution by introducing some new undergraduate courses as recommended by STEM to integrate professional and vocational education with the existing programmes. The colleges will collaborate with nearby institutions in clusters or become a university constituent as envisioned in NEP 2020.

In this context, the state's universities have been preparing the draft revised Choice Based Credit System curriculum in place of the present curriculum for both the Undergraduate level and Postgraduate level as a holistic multidisciplinary programme for four years as per the guidelines for implementation strategies of Assam Government Higher Education Department. The college has decided to sign MoU with partner institutions, set timetables in consultation with partner colleges, upgrade academic facilities and infrastructures, display collaborative arrangements for offering study programmes, charge a tuition fee, make an institutional plan for multiple entry and exit and other. The College is anticipating initiatives to be taken by Government of Assam and Dibrugarh University. The College has provided a few self-financing Add-on certificate courses to students.

16.Academic bank of credits (ABC):

ABC is not applicable in the college as NEP 2020 has not been implemented till now. However, the college maintains flexibility and openness in academic aspects under the prescribed CBCS curriculum. The academic council puts emphasis on online courses through online mode by resorting to national schemes like SWAYAM, MOOCS, NPTEL, etc. and is considering credits earned against elective and relevant courses. It can be mentioned that the college has registered under ABC to enable credit mobility for students. This will definitely decrease the dropout rate of the students in the near future.

17.Skill development:

H.C.D.G. College offers various skill development courses for the uplift of the skill of the student as well as the local community.

* A ten-day workshop on acting was organized from May 10th to May 20th 2023, to train the students about the technique of acting. A certificate was awarded to the students after the successful completion of the workshop.

* A six-month Diploma in Computer Application course was conducted from March 2022 to August 2022. Though a total of 43 students were admitted to the course, 24 completed it and received a certificate.

18.Appropriate integration of Indian Knowledge system (teaching in Indian Language, culture, using online course)

H.C.D.G. College, like other affiliated colleges, imparts education in both English and the vernacular language, i.e., Assamese. As per the curriculum, the department of Assamese offers graduate program in the Assamese language. During the remedial classes, efforts are made by the teachers from the other departments to explain the difficult concepts in detail in Assamese. The college, on the other hand, observes Mother Language Day every year on 21st February. Since the college is situated in a rural area surrounded by a number of tribal communities, emphasis is also given to preserving and protecting the indigenous culture.

The institution ensures to provide ample knowledge of ancient Indian tradition to the students. The ancient epics are displayed in the college library. Moreover, in the CBCS curriculum prepared by the Dibrugarh University for the affiliated colleges in the UG course, selected chapters from Mahabharat, Abhijnam Shakuntalam are

included. Similarly, in the department of Education teaches Adaita Vedanta, Yoga philosophy, and life sketches of Sankardeva, Shankaracharya, Yagyabalka are included in the curriculum. The H.C.D.G. College Central Library has taken a great initiative in preserving a number of sanchi manuscripts.

The institution ensures a healthy and harmonious cultural environment. In the curriculum, a study of the indigenous culture of Assam is included. Projects have been undertaken by students of the 6th semester on the indigenous culture of the Naga tribe. To make the students aware of their native culture, Bihu is celebrated every year at the college. The institution introduced the certificate course on Satriya Dance, a classical dance form, in 2020. The Weaving Training Center has been playing a significant role by imparting knowledge on the pride of this region, handloom, and handicraft.

The H.C.D.G. College has adopted morning assembly as a good practice to provide a platform for the students to offer their prayers, share sayings from great epics and learned Indian scholars, and get information on the latest happenings and inspiring thoughts. Thus, the institution ensures a better education for the students pertaining to the appropriate integration of the Indian Knowledge System.

19. Focus on Outcome based education (OBE): Focus on Outcome based education (OBE):

After successful completion of the Bachelor programme, the learners will have the ability to face most of the competitive examinations in a service areas such as civil service, banking, teaching, clerical jobs, etc. However, as the college is going to implement NEP 2020 from next academic session for which the curriculum will be redesigned on outcome based education. The institution plans to organize various programmes for the enhancement of the practical skill of students beyond existing instructional activities, such as training programme and workshop on teaching, data collection and organization, project writing, spoken English, preparation for competitive examination, a mock test on how to fill up MCQ answer script, field tour, debate on issues and challenges, report writing on a relevant topic of curricula etc.

The faculty of the college maintains daily teaching diary in order to complete the course contents within the stipulated time so that they can achieve the learning objectives as mentioned in the prescribed syllabus. In order to ensure the outcome based education (OBE) each and every department adopts three important measures viz. preparation of teaching plan, preparation of Teacher's diary and preparation of course completion certificate. At the beginning of the every semester all the departments prepared teaching plan for the session and accordingly the teachers maintained diary of the daily classes. At the end of the session course completion certificate is prepared by every faculty members which is examined by the respective Heads of the Department and submitted the same to the IQAC Coordinator and Principal.

20.Distance education/online education:

H.C.D.G. College has a Study Centre (No 2414) under the only Open University of North-eastern region Krishna Kanta Handique State Open University, Assam since 2012. The centre fulfills the educational requirement of a vast region in distance mode. It offers undergraduate courses as B.A. Honours in Assamese, English, Economics, Education, Political Science and Sociology, Bachelor of Commerce, Bachelor of Business Administration and Bachelor of Social Work. From the current year the university has offered four year undergraduate programmes as per NEP 2022. The centre has also offered post-graduate programmes in seven subjects i.e. Assamese, English, Economics, Education, Journalism and Mass Communication, Political Science and Sociology from the current academic session 2022-23. There are 28 numbers of students enrolled in the postgraduate programmes in the first academic session. The centre is planning to introduce more vocational courses for the students in near future. As the college is situated in a rural area, the students have great possibility to pursue vocational courses through ODL mode in this institution.

The faculty members have applied different online learning platforms to disseminate knowledge among the students. A number of teachers have uploaded audio-visual lectures besides offline teaching. WhatsApp groups for the students have been officially formed by the Heads of each department. Consistent contacts have been maintained by both teachers and students regarding academic and college activities. The teachers facilitate students for active engagement in suitable digital devices like power point presentation.

The teachers are encouraged to undergo rigorous training to use online teaching platforms and tools. The college organized induction programme for students of distance mode in college premises to make them aware about educational activities to be organized in the entire programme. Awareness initiatives have been undertaken through official college website and social media page of the college. Majority of drop-out students and passed out students have pursued both under-graduate and post-graduate programmes at this centre. Distance learners are given privilege to use college library. The teaching practice, practical and assignments are discussed by teachers. A few faculty members are also appointed as counselor of personal contact programme of distance education.

Hem Chandra Dev Goswami College, Nitaipukhuri ensures effective curriculum delivery through a well-planned and documented process. The academic calendar is prepared following the academic calendar approved by Dibrugarh University in advance of the commencement of the semester classes. It includes weekly working days, holidays,			

The daily timetable is finalised by the Academic Committee comprising the Vice-Principal and the heads of all departments. The master time table is displayed on the notice board after due approval of the Principal. Each class is allotted for an hour duration in line with the credit mechanism. HoDs allot the classes and the portions of the courses to be taught among the teachers within individual departments and it is circulated among the students through departmental notice boards and WhatsApp groups. The teachers record their class time, contents of teaching, mentoring, and other essential activities in individual teaching diaries daily. The Vice-Principal monitors the day-to-day conduct of classes as per the timetable and ensures flexibility whenever and wherever needed.

1.1.2 - The institution adheres to the academic calendar including for the conduct of Continuous Internal Evaluation (CIE)

The College adheres to the institutional academic calendar for conducting a comprehensive and continuous internal evaluation following the academic calendar of Dibrugarh University. The internal evaluation process consists of two Sessional Tests, presentation of the seminar using PPTs, Group Discussion, Home Assignment, and the percentage of daily attendance of the students. Students are also engaged in field surveys, projects, tour programmes, laboratory practicals, class tests, mock tests, and writing reports for experiential and participatory learning. The dates of all the sessional activities are included in the institutional academic calendar.

The examination schedule of the sessional tests is displayed ten days in advance on the college notice board. Two sessional tests of 20 marks are conducted in each course for one-hour duration. The question papers for the internal evaluation tests are prepared by concerned faculties and approved by the HoDs. The marks obtained after evaluation are displayed on the Departmental Notice Boards. Moreover, the evaluated answer scripts are discussed with the students individually and essential instructions are given as Mid Semester Feedback Assessment for upgraded performance. Again, individual or group seminars and home assignments on contemporary issues related to the course are given to the students to widen their learning scope.

1.3 - Curriculum Enrichment

1.3.1 - Institution integrates crosscutting issues relevant to Professional Ethics, Gender, Human Values, Environment and Sustainability into the Curriculum

The teachers of H.C.D.G. College practice responsible conduct towards administrative authority, colleagues, and students. They follow the 'Teachers Professional Ethics' developed by Ethics Committee for maintaining impartiality with efficiency and participatory ambience. The students also follow the 'Students Ethics' to restrict their behavior within the college campus.

Different dynamics of gender are taught to the learners using the prescribed syllabus of different departments in order to create awareness and sensitize their roles in these contexts. The Cell for Women and Development Studies organizes special talk and awareness programmes on International Women's Day and International Girl Child Day.

In order to integrate concerns of human values, the college hosts social events, book fairs, special speeches, and Yoga for Humanity days. Every day, students are urged to gather and record important principles on the whiteboard/blackboard.

Environmental Science is taught as a compulsory course in CBCS. The Eco Club, Extension cell, NCC and NSS unit take various steps on environmental issues such as observation of World Environment Day, Anti-Tobacco Day, and International Soil Day. Regular cleanliness drives, tree plantation, and nurturing are undertaken as an inaugurating agenda of different programmes along with the participation in the Chief Minister's Institutional Plantation of the Government of Assam.

2.2 - Catering to Student Diversity

2.2.1 - The institution assesses the learning levels of the students and organizes special Programmes for advanced learners and slow learners

H.C.D.G. College has developed a proper strategy to assess the learning levels of the heterogenous group of students coming from different backgrounds. Primary assessment to categorize Advanced Learners and Slow Llearners is performed by assessing the marks of the students.

Process of Assessment:

- Admission form with mandatory fields to provide marks details of the previous examinations passed to assess the learners at the initial level.
- General counselling and Orientation of the learners in the very first days after the admission before beginning of regular classess.
- Each department conducts Class Test, Sessional Examination, Group Discussion to know the levels of the students.
- Students are also encouraged to participate in co-curricular activities to detect their interest so that a better picture of their learning level can be obtained.

Programmes Initiated:

- After detecting the slow learners each department takes individual care of the slow learners throughmentoring system. Mentors keep regular contact, and detect extra curricular interest of their mentees and encourage them to participate in co-curricular activities. Learners are advised to approach their respective mentee whenever they feel necessary.
- Every department takes Remedial Classes to clear the doubts of the learners.
- Talk programmes of distinguished guests as well as special classes by Guest Faculty, Drama workshop, and Film Screenings are arranged.
- Participatory discussion is encouraged by conducting seminars, group discussion etc.

- 3. Micro teaching: Students from theEducation department practice micro-teaching in teaching skills.

Problem solving method:

2.5 - Evaluation Process and Reforms

2.5.1 - Mechanism of internal assessment is transparent and robust in terms of frequency and mode. Write description within 200 words.

The institution follows the internal assessment mechanism defined by the Dibrugarh University for UG courses. There is 20% of internal evaluation comprises of two sessional examinations for 10%, group discussion, home assignments and seminar presentation for 5%, and remaining 5% of the evaluation is made based on the class attendance of the students. The tentative dates of sessional examinations are included in the academic calendar. However, the actual examination dates are set by the Vice-Principal in consultation with the HoDs and displayed on the College Notice Board. The HoDs and course teachers are given the autonomy to finalise the units of the syllabus to be covered in each of the sessional examinations. After evaluation the marks and their performances are discussed with the students individually. The topics of seminar, home assignment and group discussions are shared by the HoDs through the departmental notice boards and whatsapp groups. Students are also encouraged to use different ICT tools in the preparation and presentation of seminars. The attendance percentage are estimated every month and communicated to the students so that they can strictly maintain it

above the minimum 75%.
